

## What University of Michigan Students Are Saying Video Transcript

**Question:** *What does it mean to know that staff at local establishments are trained in bystander intervention?*

**Student:** “I think that completing that sort of training says, it does more than saying anything ever will.”

**Question:** *How would you say thank you to a bar for completing bystander intervention training?*

**Student:** “I would definitely go to that bar a lot just because I would feel more comfortable going there.”
